

With up to two-thirds of all road deaths occurring on country roads, rural road casualties accounts for a considerable share of the total road safety problem. The risk of being killed per kilometre driven on rural roads is four to six times higher than on motorways and generally higher than on urban roads. This is mainly due to multi-functionality, hazardous roadsides and generally poorer road geometry compared to motorways, higher operating speeds and lower enforcement levels compared to urban roads.

However, the safety on rural roads appears to have been neglected over the years and has suffered from a lack of attention compared to the safety problems on motorways and urban roads. The rural road network is in fact, the most extensive network in most of the Member States, in terms of both kilometres covered and traffic. **The issue of rural road safety therefore deserves a higher priority in future road safety policies.**

In Germany in 2004 of the 5842 road deaths, 5077 people died on non-urban non-motorway roads with 1413 of these deaths occurring on national roads. In some eastern European member countries, where the motorway network is not very extensive, the accident situation on rural roads is even worst.

This is why **ETSC, with the support of its German Members, the German Road Safety Council (DVR) and the Automobile and Travel Club Germany (ARCD)**, has invited a distinguished expert, **Prof. Reinhold Maier**, from the Technical University of Dresden, to provide the audience on September 19, 2006 with a distinct pan-European perspective on this important matter. ETSC's 8th Transport Safety Lecture will provide opportunities to discuss recommendations for actions to make our rural roads safer.
